




These combine practical training in a job, with study.

You get to:

- Gain job specific skills
- Earn a wage (AND get holiday pay!) Minimum wage for an apprentice is £6.40 for the first year, and national minimum wage after.
- The average salary for Apprentice is £19,810 per year in the United Kingdom
- Have time given for study related to your role (usually 1 day a week)
- They last between 1 5 years depending on the level you choose



Apprenticeships

Choose the level of apprenticeship which is right for you.

Level 6 and 7 apprenticeships are equivalent to a university degree.

They take 3 - 6 years to complete.

Name	Level	Equivalent educational level	
Intermediate	2	5 GCSE passes (grade A*-C or 9-4)	
Advanced	3	2 A-level passes/ Level 3 Diploma/ International Baccalaureate	
Higher	4, 5, 6 and 7	Foundation, Bachelor's or Master's degree	
Degree	6 and 7	Bachelor's or master's degree	

Degree Apprenticeships

Typically these involve:

- Working for an employer 4 days a week
- Spending one day a week at college/university to study for your degree.
- The company would pay you a salary AND pay all your tuition fees
- You study part time for a degree from an affiliated university
- And gain valuable industry experience





Student Finance

What will it cost?

Tuition fee (£9,250 per year):

• Covers all essential course costs

Maintenance costs:

- Accommodation
- Study materials
- Food and drink
- Social activities

Support from the government - Student Finance

Tuition fee loans

- You won't pay anything upfront
- Not based on your household income

The government will always cover the full cost of your tuition fee each year.

So if the fee rises once you have started your course, the loan will rise to match this.

Maintenance loans

To cover maintenance costs:

- Accommodation
- Utility bills
- Food

- Based on your household income.
- Different based on location (London)
- Different based on whether you live at home (with parents/guardians), or elsewhere (at university)

Student loan repayments

Tuition fee loan

+

Maintenance loan

= Student loan

Repayments start:

- the April after you leave university
- when you are earning over £25,000 a year
- Interest will be generated on a student loan when the first instalment is paid.

Anything unpaid after 40 years is written off.*

Interest

- While you're studying, up until the April after your course, interest is **around 7**%.
- The amount of interest is based on the RPI rate, although due to high inflation and interest rate, it was capped at 7.8% in April this year.

Repayments

Yearly income before tax	Monthly repayment

Repayments are calculated as **9**% of anything earned **above £25,000**.

Repayments are always based on **what you earn** – not what you owe.

Most people will **never pay it all back**.

Choosing the right university for you

- **Style** from traditional, with a focus on subject-based courses and research, to modern universities with a greater focus on vocational courses.
- **Location** some are based in large cities, others in smaller towns. This can have a major influence on the environment and lifestyle on offer.
- Size larger universities can have more than 20,000 students, whereas some of the smallest have only a few thousand.
- Culture and facilities influenced by a range of factors, including the diversity of students who attend.
- What graduates do all universities collect destination statistics. It can be interesting to find out the types of jobs or further study students go on to.
- Tuition fees vary between course providers. Check if there are any scholarships/bursaries available.
- Living costs accommodation, transport, and food can vary enormously.



Choosing the right course for you

- What does the course cover?
- Courses with the same title may be very different make sure to look carefully at the core course content, and the range of optional studies/modules available.
- Which modules are the most interesting and relevant to career aspirations?
- See if the course or university/college offers any internship, placement, or study abroad opportunities.
- How is the course taught structured teaching, or more independent research? How many lectures are there, and how much group work will be done in seminars?
- How is the course assessed? Some may be majority essays, some are all exams
- Is the course well regarded? some universities are very strong in some subjects








When to apply for 2023 entry

14 May UCAS Undergraduate Apply opens for 2023 entry.

7 September First day for receipt of completed applications.

15 October* Application deadline for courses in medicine, veterinary

medicine/science, and dentistry, and courses at Oxford **or** Cambridge.

29 January* Equal consideration application deadline.

25 February UCAS Extra opens.

* All 18:00 (UK time)



School Deadlines



- Deadline for completion and submission of UCAS forms END OF OCTOBER
- N.B. School deadline for Oxbridge, veterinary science, Dentistry and Medicine is END OF SEPTEMBER prior to the 15th October UCAS deadline)


